target for elimination; neither the author nor the largely untenured readers he has among the MLA membership are quite respectable. We have written repeatedly, asking for reconsideration, citing the manifest interest in such a seminar and the increasing attendance at the previous three, but to no avail. While <u>Pynchon Notes</u> will do its best to facilitate communication among its readers, we feel that nothing can replace the somewhat different kind of exchanges that go on at MLA conventions. Therefore we support, and urge our readers to support Beverly Lyon Clark's effort to organize a special session entitled "Teaching Pynchon to Undergraduates" for the 1980 Convention (see MEETING, p. 5 below).

We are eager to continue hearing from our readers, and want especially to elicit items of the sort contributed to this issue by Marcus Smith and Javaid Qazi.

The editors have received inquiries from Don. Larsson, University of Wisconsin, Madison, and Richard F. Patteson, Mississippi State University, concerning Pynchon's plans for his next novel or novels as described in <u>Newsweek</u> (7 Aug. 78, p. 7). We are unable to say anything more than Bill Roeder reported on the basis of unnamed sources: "Thomas Pynchon ... has two novels in the works.
